The concert will begin with the overture to Beatrice et Benedict, a opera based loosely on Shakespeare's Much Ado About Nothing.

After the Mozart Concerto which follows the CTSO will play Barber's Adagio for Strings and Bizet's Symphony in C.

Koornhof made his debut at the age of nine, since then appearing with all the major South African orchestras and with several overseas. He twice travelled as soloist with the National Youth Orchestra on overseas tours, studied at the Julliard School of Music with Dorothy DeLay and took master classes with Pinchas Zuckerman, Itzhak Perlman and Gyorgy Pauk.

In 1994, he was the first South African soloist invited by the Moscow Chamber Orchestra and the Palaces of St Petersburg International Chamber Music Festival to undertake an extensive tour of Russia.

A lecturer at the University of Potchefstroom, he has written Of Muses and Magic: Essays for Musicians, a book on neuro-linguistic programming and offers workshops for performers and teachers on NLP.
